She recently hosted the Inaugural Los Angeles State of Women & Girls Address and Young Women's Assembly, which brought together civic and thought leaders — as well as 700 girls, young women, and trans youth — for in-depth conversations, panels, and presentations on the state of gender equity in Los Angeles.

Amy has led multiple efforts to grow girls' participation in the city's sports and fitness programs — from a new camp that pairs young women with active duty LAFD female firefighters, to the Girls Play L.A. program, which gets girls involved in sports at an early age to learn leadership skills, gain self-esteem, and stay fit.

She also led successful efforts to fund and complete the City's first-ever data-driven analysis of the status of women and girls and to expand the city's

Domestic Assault Response Teams (DART) to every police division in the city. DART is now a universal city program for the first time since its inception.

Amy helped found the Los Angeles Neighborhood Land Trust, which builds green spaces in Los Angeles' most park-poor neighborhoods; the Pobladores Fund, a giving circle that contributes to local grassroots social justice causes; and the XX Fund, which makes annual grants to nonprofit organizations that enable women and girls to strive for economic justice and live free of discrimination. She is a past board member of People Assisting the Homeless, Just Detention International, and the Liberty Hill Foundation, among other social justice groups.

As the First Lady of Los Angeles, Amy has actively partnered with the Getty House Foundation Board of Directors and the Mayor's Office to open Getty House to the public — more than 16,000 visitors to date — and reinvigorate its programming with its Engage L.A. community programming and Women's Leadership Series. Under her leadership, Getty House has served as a platform for major policy achievements, including the successful effort to triple the number of jobs available to L.A.'s youth, and the city's expansive drought education campaign.

Amy's professional career includes positions as Executive Director of the Coalition for Kids, Director of the Progressive L.A. Network, Strategic Planner for the Los Angeles County Department of Public Social Services, and work on national, statewide, and local political campaigns.

Zweiman is the founder of *Welcome Blanket*, a new crowd-sourced artistic action that reimagines the 2000-mile length of the proposed border wall dividing the US and Mexico as an inclusive 2000-mile length of yarn. *Welcome Blanket* invites participants to knit, crochet, or sew individual welcome blankets for new refugees and other immigrants coming to the States, and include personal notes of welcome and stories of immigration to the Smart Museum of Art.

Zweiman received her AB from Brown University in visual arts and economics and her Masters in Architecture from Harvard University Graduate School of Design. She lives and works in Los Angeles.

[Jenna Didier](#), in pursuit of a new approach to the built environment, believes that each city is an organism whose life force is the network of communities that live within it, sustaining it through the infrastructures they create. A lifelong interest in the creation and use of public space led her to a career in public art. The trajectory of her path began with the development of technical skills in robotics, engineering, and metal fabrication to create mechanical effects, sculpture, and large public water features, and has evolved into an active engagement in place-making. Many of her projects discover the invisible but powerful forces influencing a site and dramatize them through embedding interactive lighting, fog, water, or mechanical effects.
